## University of Hawai'i Strategic Plan Update, 2008-15

 In response to Hawai`i's workforce needs, Vice President Johnsrud stated that the <u>University System</u> is challenged to increase the educational capital (Second Decade Project) of the state by increasing:



- College going rates,
- Retention,
- Transfer rates from two- to four-year institutions,
- Production of certificates, associate and bachelor degrees.

## University of Hawai'i Strategic Plan Update, 2008-15

- In addition, the other priorities the University System has identified as higher education needs are:
  - Expand workforce development initiatives;
  - Contribute to the state's economy;
  - Address underserved regions and populations of the state; &
  - Renew and expand infrastructure.



## University of Hawai`i, Community College System Strategic Plan Update, 2008-15

- The UHCC system-wide organizing principles will be Second Decade/ Biennium Budget Categories:
  - Increase the educational capital of the State;



- Meet workforce development needs;
- Diversify the state's economy;
- Serve under-represented regions and populations; and
- Create an efficient, sustainable organization.

## University of Hawai'i, Kapi'olani CC

- As KCC begins to organize for updating its Strategic Plan (2008-2015) and Long Range Development Plan (LRDP), we will adopt and modify these organizing principles, i.e.,
  - Increase the educational capital of the State,




- Meet workforce development needs,

## **UH System, UHCC System & KCC's Strategic Plans**

- For each organizing principle category, a small number of goals will be set that will:
  - Be clearly defined,
  - Be quantifiable,
  - Have a baseline,
  - Have a best practice benchmark,
  - Have a target,
  - Have a progress report,
  - Be derivative to the campus,
  - Be integrated with other UH benchmarking/goal setting projects.




#### Align KCC Planning with UH and UHCC Organizing Principles:



## KCC Strategic/Long Range Development Plan

- To align with UH and UHCC system plans to respond to changing workforce development needs and to "Renew and expand infrastructure," KCC has undertaken a Strategic and Long Range Development Planning process.
- The Chancellor's Taskforce, is developing a "Scope of Services Plan" for the LRDP to be submitted to the UHCC Office by January 1, 2008 for input and to be utilized in the selection of a planning and consulting firm.



## KCC Strategic/Long Range Development Plan

- A campus Planning Committee will be formed to address both strategic and long-range planning.
  - Committee members will represent all academic programs and AES units that have tactical plans, plus representatives from governance bodies.
  - The Committee will hold open forums on both plans to gather wider campus input from, especially from community stakeholders.
  - The Committee will report its plans and recommendations to the PPAC.

## Ka`ie`ie -

A degree pathway partnership agreement through which students can be enrolled in both UHM and KCC campuses and earn two degrees.



## Ka 'ie 'ie

Ka`ie`ie students are considered continuing UH Manoa students upon transfer.

- Ka`ie`ie program paths to UH Manoa:




- 1. Apply to UHM, be accepted but declare KCC as your home institution and take courses at KCC;
- 2. Begin at KCC and apply to UHM as a Ka`ie`ie student after earning 24 credits, and maintaining a 2.0 GPA at KCC; when accepted to UHM continue taking classes at KCC, indicating it as home institution.



## **High School Connection**

- KCC's goal is to increase the number of graduating seniors who enter college by creating an awareness of the benefit of going to college.
- KCC will provide intensive and concentrated hands-on, one-on-one support to assist high school seniors through each step of the college preparation, admissions, testing, and enrollment.
  - All services delivered at the high schools,
  - Target: 100% participation of senior high school students,
  - Master calendars of services and events,
  - Formal acceptance letter to KCC issues with high school diploma.



## **High School Connection**



- College Connection Program features:
  - Alignment of multiple college outreach efforts;
  - Intensive connection with high school students and staff;
  - Focus on removal of barriers, e.g.:
    - College information including Ka`ie`ie program, American Diploma Project, Achieving the Dream, STEM, etc.;
    - College application assistance;
    - Financial aid (FAFSA) and UH scholarship assistance including centennial scholarships;
    - Compass placement and assessment; &
    - Enrollment assistance, i.e., admission and registration.



## Achieving the Dream

- To meet statewide UHCC goals, Vice-President Morton and each of the seven UHCCs are supporting and implementing "Achieving the Dream."
  - National initiative to help more community college students succeed (i.e., complete courses, earn certificates and earn degrees).
  - In Hawai`i this effort is especially focused on student groups that have faced the most significant barriers to success, i.e.,
    - Native Hawaiians
    - Low income &
    - Underserved regions & populations




## Scholarships and Financial Aid

- Through the generous support of individuals and private organizations in the community, over 50 scholarships are awarded each academic year throughout the campus. They range in value from \$500-\$3,600.
- In general, scholarships are awarded on the basis of *financial* need, not necessarily as defined by federal guidelines, to continuing students only. Many also have a minimum grade point average requirement.



## Diversifying the State Economy through Creative Use of Technology

 KCC is working with DBEDT, developing a Creative Academies Program.



Provide students with the knowledge, attitudes, and workforce skills in Science, Technology, Engineering & Math (STEM) and career programs, i.e., New Media Arts (NMA) that are necessary for them to be creative, innovative, and entrepreneurial in these areas.

- The Program Mantra is:
  - "Innovate, Create & Disseminate!" via the use of applied technology, contextual and project based learning.

## THE CREATIVE ACADEMIES PROGRAM:

- Empowers students K-20 with skills to innovate through creative exploration;
- Weaves creative thinking into STEM and career program training via Creative Academies pilot program in animation, digital media, game development, writing and publishing with KCC and DOE; &
- Connects partners with shared vision in creative industry development.



## Diversifying the State Economy through Creative Use of Technology

## THE CREATIVE ACADEMIES PROGRAM:

- Create jobs for digital arts professionals in Hawai`i, as well as UH Manoa/ACM, & KCC New Media Arts students
- Establishes "Creative Industries Zone"
  - Creation Center Digital Media & Arts Incubator,
  - KCC and Hawai`i Film Studio Digital Media Production Center,
  - Creative Academies of Hawai`i (K-12 courses in creative media), &
  - Teacher training for STEM Creative Academies.
